THE PROJECT



“Enhancing European Coordination for National Research Programmes in the Area of Security at Major Events - The House” is a project funded by the European Commission, DG Enterprise and Industry, involving a consortium of 24 EU Member States, and is being implemented from March 2012 until February 2014.

The House involves the testing of the provision of coordination standards during major events in Europe. These standards concern key areas which were identified as commonalities of interest as being the basic constituents of major event security planning in Europe requiring further coordination. After the elaboration of these standards in previous projects (most notably EU-SEC and EU-SEC II) their provision is now being tested in The House project.



Coordination standards

The activities of the project involve the use of coordination standards established by the consortiums of EU Member States involved in the EU-SEC and EU-SEC II projects. These standards, called Coordination Tools and Methodologies (CTMs), can be split in to two groups: the first are established standards and the second are tools to be developed during The House project.

Established Standards

CTM 1: The IPO Security Planning Model

CTM 2: Best Practices in Public Private Partnerships (PPPs)

CTM 3: Media Management Guidelines

CTM 4: Ethical and Operational Standards for Security Products

Tools for Development

CTM 5: Specialist Technical Equipment Pool (STEP)

CTM 6: European Major Events Register (EMER)

CTM 7: Training and Networking Curricula

OUTCOMES



Currently in the testing phase, The House offers a range of services (CTMs) which combine the experience and lessons learned by EU-SEC II and the UNICRI Programme on Major Events Security. The Project is expected to have two main impacts: The adoption of a methodology for the provision of a broad range of services to the EU national authorities in charge of security planning for Major Events; and The creation of common European security standards at large.

While these two objectives will be achieved, European citizens can enjoy the same levels of security at all European major events in line with provisions of the Stockholm Programme and the EU Internal Security Strategy (ISS). In addition, it will eventually facilitate the establishment and strengthening of partnerships between the public and the private sectors for the security of Major Events across the European Union.
